16.3 Motions relating to Financial Matters (Book Ref 3) Criterion (a)

Mr Allan Perryman moving, Bishop Michael Stead seconding

- 16.3.4 That the General Synod budget for the year ended 31 December 2018, be approved.
- 16.3.5 That Synod receives the General Synod forecast budget for years ended 31 December 2019 and 2020.

16.18 Refugees on Manus Island and Nauru (Book Ref 4-146) Criterion (b)

Bishop Philip Huggins moving, The Very Rev'd Dr Peter Catt seconding

That this General Synod, in the divine compassion and as a matter of human decency, recognizing the exceptional circumstances, urges the Federal Government to resettle in Australia, by Christmas 2017, any refugees still detained on Manus Island and Nauru as at 1 November 2017.

That this General Synod urges the Federal Government to partner with the Churches as regards the healing and resettling of these refugees.

16.19 Refugees from Syria and Iraq (Book Ref 4-146) Criterion (b)

Note: Mover to seek leave to move the motion in this amended form.

Bishop Philip Huggins moving, The Very Rev'd Peter Catt seconding

The That this General Synod, recognising the exceptional circumstances, urges our Federal Government, as soon as possible, to make another allocation of 12,000 additional refugee places for people, <u>especially</u> <u>Christians and other minorities</u>, displaced by the ongoing conflict in Syria and Iraq.

That, relatedly, this General Synod urges the Federal Government to increase funding to assist their integration into Australian society, and especially as regards their employment assistance including the provision of assistance and training to obtain employment opportunities.

That this General Synod, from the experience of its members, affirms the life-saving consequences of the earlier extra 12000 places, particular for Christians and other minorities who had been targeted by ISIS.

16.20 Action to contribute to the Paris Climate Accord (Book Ref 4-115) Criterion (b)

The Very Rev'd Dr Peter Catt moving, Dr Beth Heyde seconding

Noting -

- the global groundswell of community and industry support for effective and rapid action to reduce greenhouse gas emissions in line with the very challenging goal expressed in the 2015 Paris Climate Accord (to limit warming to 1.5°C above pre-industrial levels);
- the critical importance of community action, both in achieving that goal and in leading governments to act;
- the Anglican Communion's fifth mark of mission: 'to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth', and
- General Synod's Protection of the Environment Canon 2007 which required meaningful action and reporting by participating Dioceses on steps taken to reduce their environmental impact;

The General Synod:

- 1. Encourages Federal and State governments in Australia to act quickly to resolve perceived conflicts of interest between the wider community and commercial beneficiaries of fossil fuels, and show leadership in reducing greenhouse gas emissions through effective market mechanisms based on consistent expert recommendations.
- 2. Requests each Diocese that has adopted the Protection of the Environment Canon 2007 to report to the Standing Committee of General Synod in 2018, and to the next meeting of General Synod, on progress in reducing their environmental impact (as required by s.3(1)), with particular emphasis on energy efficiency in order to minimise contributions to global warming.
- 3. Encourages Dioceses to make use of standardised instruments such as the Parish Quick Carbon Self-Report instrument (available through the Public Affairs Commission) in order to develop an internal reporting mechanism.
- 4. Requests all Dioceses to report to the Standing Committee of General Synod in 2018, and to the next meeting of General Synod, on progress made towards divestment from fossil fuels, as encouraged by motion 61/14 of General Synod.
- 5. Encourages Dioceses to incorporate studies in ecotheology within priestly formation and lay education programs.
- 6. Encourages Dioceses to give publicity to the work of the Australian Religious Response to Climate Change (ARRCC) towards spirituallyinspired stewardship in reducing greenhouse gas emissions: and to encourage participation in the work of this multi-faith network and consideration also of secular networks with similar aims to reduce global greenhouse emissions, such as 350.org.

21.4 EuthanasiaAssisted Dying

Note: Mover to seek leave to move the motion in this amended form.

Dr Denise Cooper-Clarke moving, Dr Karin Sowada seconding

The General Synod, <u>noting_recognising</u> the <u>continued</u> push for<u>laws</u> <u>concerning</u> 'assisted dying' in a number of Australian States –

- a) Notes Synod Resolution 81/10, affirming the sanctity of life; that life is God's gift and that our task is to protect, nurture and sustain life to the best of our ability;
- b) Notes that in 1995, Synod expressed its opposition to euthanasia in response to legislation passed by the Northern Territory Parliament;
- a)c) Opposes the legalisation of <u>assisted dying</u>doctor-assisted suicide and/or euthanasia;
- b)d) Urges all Australian State and Territory governments to better resource palliative care services, to improve palliative care in the community, including in regional and remote communities, Aboriginal communities and nursing homes, and to provide better training in palliative care for all health professionals; and

c)e) Urges Recognising the vital contribution made by people of faith to

<u>public debate, urges</u> Australian Anglicans to contact their MP's to express their views, <u>particularly in NSW and Victoria where legislation</u> <u>will be debated this year</u>.

21.5 Apology to the LGBTQI Community

Note: The mover intends to seek leave to move the motion in the revised form below (the original text is reproduced after the revised text).

Revised Motion

Bishop John Parkes AM moving, Bishop Ian Palmer seconding

This General Synod:

- 1. Affirms that all people are made in the image of God regardless of their race, sex, economic background, political affiliation and the particular temptations that they face as human beings on this side of the Fall.
- 2. Offers a heartfelt apology to those who have been hurt by our failure to treat all people as precious in the sight of God.
- 3. In particular we apologise to, and seek forgiveness from, people who are lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, intersex or queer whom we have hurt by words and behaviour that have not displayed the love of God. We are deeply sorry for any harm we have done and repent of such ungodly behaviour.
- 4. We affirm that as image bearers all people have a deep and natural hunger for mutual love, a search for identity and a longing for completeness. Scripture teaches the proper expression of human sexuality is between a man and a woman within the covenant of marriage. We pledge ourselves to treat with compassion and care those who struggle in the area of their sexual orientation. We commit to walking with them and to encouraging them and each other in a life of discipleship characterised by humility, repentance, faith and the confidence that comes from knowing God's grace and forgiveness.
- 5. Commits the Anglican Church of Australia to teaching its members to respect difference and to understand the struggles that others endure as we walk together in humble, faithful discipleship in obedience to the word of God.
- Commits to fostering churches and fellowships where compassion and grace abound and where the love of God is expressed to all, no matter their background or struggles. In particular we desire to be places where LGBTIQ+ people will feel safe.
- 7. Asks and encourages local churches to speak the truth in love and to demonstrate our repentance in changed attitudes and conduct.

Original Motion Text

The General Synod –

- 1. Offers a heartfelt apology to people who are lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, intersex or queer and commits to treating with compassion and care those who struggle in the area of their sexual identity and orientation.
- Affirms that all people are made in the image of God regardless of sexual identity, and no one is without sin, for all fall short of the glory of God. Yet because God's love knows no bounds and extends to all without distinction and without prejudice, if those who bear the image of God are mocked, excluded or abused on account of their sexuality, God grieves.
- 3. Seeks forgiveness from God and from our sisters and brothers.
- 4. Apologises to lesbian, gay and transgender people for the hurt and pain inflicted upon you by words and deeds, including thoughtless words, and actions from people in the church.
- 5. Repents of and is sorry for words of derision, mockery and exclusion when directed against persons who are different.
- 6. Is ashamed that Anglican churches sometimes fail to be safe environments where people can speak openly and honestly about their struggles.
- 7. Asks forgiveness for the physical, emotional, psychological and spiritual violence inflicted upon God's children who are lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, intersex and queer, by what the church has done and failed to do.
- 8. Commits the Anglican Church of Australia to listening to you and to learning more about our human sexuality and gender and the way this influences our Christian discipleship.
- 9. Commits the Anglican Church to teaching church members to respect difference and understand the struggles that others endure as we follow Jesus together.
- 10. Commits to creating churches and fellowships where compassion and grace abound; where LGBTIQ+ people will feel safe.
- 11. Asks and encourages churches to make this apology and live as Jesus's disciples with changed attitudes and conduct.

13 NOTICES OF MOTION RECEIVED FROM THE FLOOR OF SYNOD

22.10 Faithfulness in Service and National Consistency regarding professional standards

Note: Mover to seek leave to move the motion in this amended form.

Canon Sandy Grant moving, The Very Rev'd Kanishka Raffel seconding

Synod notes repeated concern expressed for children and vulnerable persons other than children in our churches and organisations, and the need to protect both children and adults from abuse. Synod also notes the desirability of a nationally consistent approach to professional standards wherever possible. Therefore Synod requests the General Synod Standing Committee (GSSC) to consult with the Professional Standards Commission (PSC) and to report to the next session of General Synod on the status of *Faithfulness in Service* (in the current form approved by GSSC) as our national code of conduct in the various dioceses, specifically:

- 1. Which dioceses have adopted the *Faithfulness in Service* without amendment as their code of conduct?
- 2. Which dioceses have adopted *Faithfulness in Service* with amendment as their code of conduct?
- 3. Which dioceses have used *Faithfulness in Service*, with or without amendment, in some manner other than as a code of conduct?
- 4. Which dioceses have a code of conduct other than Faithfulness in Service (with or without amendments)?

Synod also requests GSSC, in consultation with the <u>PSCProfessional</u> <u>Standards Commission</u>, to report to the next session of General Synod on preferred options for effectively ensuring that professional standards regarding the care and protection of adults, especially the vulnerable in our midst, are nationally consistent to the greatest extent possible.

22.13 Acknowledgement of Work on Child Safety Framework

The Hon Richard Refshauge moving, Bishop John Parkes seconding

Noting that the suite of bills to give effect to a national Anglican framework for child protection has passed with overwhelming support and endorsement. Gives thanks for the work of the Professional Standards Commission, the Royal Commission Working Group and the Episcopal Standards Working Group, notes the extraordinary commitment of all of the members of the commission and those groups, and gives thanks to God especially for the 20 years of commitment of Garth Blake to ensure as far as possible that we are a child-safe church.

22.14 Request for Doctrine Commission Report

The General Synod requests the Doctrine Commission to prepare a report on the distinction between the gospel of Christ crucified and the consequences of that gospel.

22.15 Rohingya Muslim People

That this General Synod noting with sadness today's reports about the suffering of the Rohingya Muslim people, prayerfully urges our government's further diplomatic initiative and provision of humanitarian assistance.

22.16 Recognition and thanks for Child Protection Work

Mr Daniel Aspinall moving, Bishop Garry Weatherill seconding

That this General Synod recognises:

- a. The unprecedented level of support in this session for consistent national standards and approaches with respect to child protection, episcopal standards and redress for abuse survivors measures;
- b. that this reflects the huge investment of time, energy and expertise by key leaders over many years especially in the extensive consultation and collaboration that took place preceding this session; and

that this General Synod, therefore, records and expresses its sincere thanks and deep appreciation to:

- Mr Garth Blake SC and the members of the Professional Standards Commission;
- The Honourable Justice Debra Mullins and the members of the Church Law Commission and Episcopal Standards Task Force; and
- Mr Michael Shand QC;

for their unstinting and tireless efforts to prepare legislation and garner support to ensure the protection of children and the accountability of clergy and church workers in this Church

22.17 Royal Commission

- (a) gives thanks to God for the work of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse;

- (c) expresses its sincere gratitude for the engagement of the Royal Commission with this Church, particularly through the attendance of the Chair, the Hon Peter McClellan AM at National Bishops Meetings, and the address of Robert Fitzgerald AM at this General Synod;
- (d) prays for the Royal Commission as it completes its work, and that its lasting legacy will be an Australia in which children are safe, including in this Church.
