R97/19 Bishop Michael Stead moving, Dr Michael Tong seconding General Synod, recognising the urgent need for an increasing number of well-prepared, biblically literate and theologically astute candidates for ordination, encourages the Ministry & Mission Commission to continue its work on Minimum Requirements for Ordination and publish its guidelines as soon **Carried**

It further expresses its desire that the aspirations published in the draft guidelines of one year's full-time study for the diaconate and of an approved theological degree for the priesthood (or a course of studies as approved by the Bishop for either) be at least retained, if not strengthened.

This General Synod recognising the financial stress and administrative strain placed on regional and rural dioceses due to the legacy of historic sexual abuse claims, the higher costs associated with the provision of ministry in regional and remote locations and the smaller asset base of most regional and rural dioceses: requests that the Metropolitan Dioceses take on greater responsibility, in conjunction with agencies including ABM, CMS and BCA, for supporting ministry within each Province and requests that the General Synod Standing Committee coordinate with the Metropolitan Dioceses and the Diocesan Financial Advisory Task Force to put together a plan to enable the continued ministry of the Anglican Church of Australia in regional and rural areas where that is not able to be provided by a regional or rural diocese.

1. notes that the Australian Law Reform Commission's (ALRC) Review of Surrogacy Laws (Discussion Paper 89) promotes proposals that, if accepted would move Australian law away from a purely altruistic model of surrogacy as currently legislated;
2. informs the Commonwealth Parliament that it:
 - a. affirms that all people, including unborn children in surrogacy arrangements, are made in the image of God, and that their rights must be upheld;
 - b. holds the formation of family and the welcoming of children in the highest regard, honours the social significance of gestational and maternal care, and recognises with compassion the pain of infertility;
 - c. affirms that children are a gift to be received, not a right to be claimed or a good to be provided, and that no universal right to parenthood has been established in law;
 - d. believes children have a natural interest, wherever possible, in knowing their biological and gestational origins and, where in their best interests, being raised by their own biological parents;
 - e. deplores the commodification of children and the exploitation of vulnerable women, whether in Australia or overseas, and calls on the Commonwealth Parliament to enhance legislated safeguards for this purpose;
 - f. opposes absolutely the legalisation of commercial surrogacy — whether in name or effect — and calls on the Commonwealth Parliament to definitively reject any recommendation to that effect.
3. notes that the ALRC's final report is due to the Attorney-General on September 11, 2026 and thereafter to be tabled in Parliament within 15 sitting days;
4. requests the Primate to write to the Prime Minister, the Attorney-General and the Leader of the Opposition informing them of this resolution by the end of September, 2026.

Bishop Mark served in parish ministry in the Diocese of Sydney from 1988, in the parishes of Lalor Park and Kings Langley, North Sydney and Roseville. He was subsequently called to the Diocese of Brisbane, where he served as Rector of the Parish of Noosa for more than a decade. From 2014 to 2019 he also served as Area Dean of the Deanery of Sunshine Coast.

Mark has been a member of the General Synod since 2017. In 2019 he was elected as the Bishop of the Diocese of Bathurst, where he has served faithfully as bishop, pastor and leader of a diverse rural and regional diocese.

General Synod gives thanks for Bishop Mark's commitment to the ministry and mission of Christ's Church, and for the pastoral care, wisdom and leadership he has brought to his episcopal ministry.

Synod also gives thanks for the support and partnership of his wife Susan, whose loving and faithful support has been a tremendous blessing to Mark throughout his ministry.

General Synod offers its prayers and warmest good wishes to Bishop Mark and Susan as they enter this new season of life and ministry. Synod prays that God will richly bless them in retirement and in all that lies ahead, and that Mark's years of faithful service will continue to bear fruit for the glory of God and the building up of Christ's Church.

General Synod notes that Bishop Ian Coutts is retiring in August as the Bishop of Bunbury, bringing to a close many years of faithful ordained ministry in Australia and England. Synod gives thanks to God for his service and records its deep appreciation for the breadth and diversity of his ministry.

Bishop Ian began his ordained ministry in the Diocese of Birmingham, serving as Curate of Hamstead St Bernard from 1989 to 1992. He then served for many years in the Diocese of Southwark, first as Vicar of Warlingham with Chelsham and Farleigh from 1992 to 1997, and subsequently in the same parish from 1997 to 2000. He continued to minister in England through permissions to officiate in the Diocese of Southwark from 2000 to 2003 and the Diocese of Oxford from 2003 to 2011. In 2011 he moved into ministry in the Diocese of Canberra and Goulburn, receiving authority to officiate while continuing his postgraduate studies completing his PhD in 2015 on the subject of the Family from a Trinitarian theological perspective. He subsequently served in a number of roles which brought together theological education, ministry formation and practical ministry. From 2013 to 2018 he served part-time as Anglicare Parish Partnerships Coordinator for Anglicare ACT, NSW West and South West. From 2014 to 2018 he was also Lecturer in Practical Theology and Ministry Formation Coordinator at St Mark's National Theological Centre.

In 2018 Bishop Ian was elected as the 10th Bishop of Bunbury. Since then he has served the Diocese with distinction, while also contributing to the wider life of the Anglican Church of Australia as the Bunbury representative on the General Synod and on the Safe Church Commission.

General Synod gives thanks for the breadth of Bishop Ian's ministry: for his service in parish ministry, his commitment to theological education and the formation of Christian leaders, his work alongside Anglicare, and his episcopal ministry in Bunbury. His background in social work has been a particular gift to the Church. Synod acknowledges the gifts and experience he has brought to the service of Christ and his Church.

Synod expresses its gratitude for his contribution to the councils of the national Church and for the perspective gained through ministry in both England and Australia.

General Synod offers Bishop Ian its prayers and warmest good wishes as he retires from episcopal ministry. Synod prays that God will richly bless him in this new season of life, giving thanks

Bishop Garry was ordained in Adelaide in 1986 and served in the parishes of Brighton, St Peter's Cathedral, St Bede's Semaphore and St Paul's Port Adelaide. He was elected as a member of General Synod in 1995, representing the Diocese of Adelaide.

In 1997, he moved to the Diocese of Willochra to serve as the Ministry Development Office. After serving as Archdeacon of Willochra, then the Administrator of the Diocese, he was elected as the Bishop of Willochra in 2000. In 2011, he was elected as the Bishop of Ballarat.

In a quarter of a century of episcopal ministry, Bishop Garry has not only served with distinction in two dioceses, but has also served in a range of national roles, including:

- Chair of Mission to Seafarers (2004-2011)
- Co-chair of the Anglican / Lutheran Dialogue (2002-2011)
- Episcopal Advisor (Australia) to the Oratory of the Good Shepherd (since 2014)
- Bishop Protector for the Third Order of Society of St Francis (since 2014)
- Warden of The Community of the Holy Name, Cheltenham 2012-2021
- Visitor to the Society of the Sacred Mission 2007-2012
- Visitor the Community of St Barnabas and St Cecilia 2001-2011
- Chair, Advisory Council for Anglican Religious Life in Australia (since 2012)
- Chair, Liturgy Commission of General Synod (2015-2022)
- An Episcopal Member of the Appellate Tribunal (since 2017)

Bishop Garry has also made a long and significant contribution to the work of the Anglican Board of Mission. He commenced as a Board Member in 2006, and was a Director from 2011 to 2022, also serving as Chair from 2015 to 2020.

Since 2014, Bishop Garry has served on the General Synod Standing Committee and its Executive Committee. He has served on innumerable sub-committees and task forces with commitment and grace. Bishop Garry has demonstrated a commitment above and beyond the call of duty, not letting ill-health or limited mobility prevent him from serving. Garry has often spoken words of wisdom from his years of experience at

just the right moment, that have altered the course of debate and helpfully resolved an apparently intractable impasse, always with good humour and courtesy.

Bishop Garry has the courage to present contrary positions but also with wisdom, principle, deep thoughtfulness and care for the church. He is respectful of the principles and theological positions of other. He has a thoughtful and reflective understanding of the episcopal vocation.

General Synod offers its prayers and best wishes to Garry on his retirement as Bishop as Ballarat, and prays for God's riches blessing on his continued service of the Lord in his retirement.

General Synod, noting that this is likely to be the last session of the General Synod he will attend as a member, gives great thanks to God and records its deep appreciation for the outstanding service of Dr Robert Tong AM to the Anglican Church of Australia and the wider Anglican Communion.

Dr Tong was first elected as a Sydney Diocesan Representative to the General Synod in 1979 and attended his first General Synod in 1981. He has attended 14 ordinary sessions and two special sessions of General Synod, a total of 16 sessions.

General Synod acknowledges Robert's deep personal commitment to Christ, his tireless commitment to the ministry and mission of Christ's Church, his dedication to fostering unity and understanding, and his leadership in church governance. - a member of the Church Law Commission (formerly the Canon Law Commission) since 1994;
